## Scouting Report: Previewing Michigan-Penn State With Nittany Lions Insider

Michigan will face its toughest road atmosphere of the season on Saturday when it travels to Happy Valley to take on No. 2 Penn State.

The school is hosting ESPN's College GameDay, holding its annual whiteout and will be playing under the lights with kickoff scheduled for 7:30 p.m. on ABC.

The previous No. 2 team, Clemson, lost last week to Syracuse, opening the door for Penn State to jump up.

"In a lot of ways, it's by default," BlueWhiteIllustrated.com writer Nate Bauer said. "When the teams above you lose, you naturally move up. I don't think anyone, even within Penn State, would try to make an argument that the schedule they have faced has been of the level that they're going to face this week, next week and the week after that, playing Michigan, Ohio State and Michigan State."

The Nittany Lions (6-0) have beaten Akron, Pittsburgh, Georgia State, Iowa, Indiana and Northwestern. The closest of those games came against Iowa on the road, where Penn State won on the final play of the game, 21-19.

"They're a team that is very explosive," Bauer said. "They have the ability to beat you in a variety of ways."

Redshirt junior quarterback Trace McSorley and junior running back Saquon Barkley lead the Nittany Lion offense. Barkley is consistently mentioned as a Heisman Trophy candidate, and is both the team's leading rusher and receiver.

On the season, Barkley has 102 carries for 649 yards and six touchdowns and has caught 29 passes for 395 yards and two more scores. He's also returned a kickoff for a touchdown and thrown for one.

Barkley leads the nation in all-purpose yards (217.0 per game) and has scored a touchdown in 13 straight games — tied for the longest active streak by a running back in the country. He is 17th in the nation for rushing yards per game, with 108.2.

"Barkley and McSorley complement each other really well," Bauer said. "Saquon Barkley is so good that Trace doesn't need to be all-world. He just needs to make good decisions, stay upright, not take negative-yardage plays and let his playmakers make plays for him."

Bauer said that he does think there's a chance Michigan's defense limits Barkley.

"He's going to get bottled up a lot," Bauer said. "He's going to have negative-yard carries and one-, two- and three-yard carries. It's that one instance where he finds a crease, and he'll make you pay."

Last year's Penn State team would dig themselves a hole and be forced to come back. That's not so much the case this year, Bauer said. The Nittany Lions have taken early leads — they have outscored opponents by an incredible margin of 76-0 in the first quarter — and then held teams off in the second half. They've been more methodical instead of solely relying on big plays.

"This game is about Trace McSorley because Michigan's defensive line is going to create problems," Bauer said. "They're going to create disruption up front. If Michigan can get to Trace and put him on the ground, that's a huge problem. And they're going to bottle up Barkley."

McSorley is 130-of-194 passing for 1,594 yards and has thrown for 13 touchdowns against four picks this year.

Outside of the big two, Penn State has several other weapons on offense. Senior tight end Mike Gesicki is an important part of the attack and stretches the field down the middle. He has been battling injuries the past couple weeks, but has caught 22 passes for 176 yards and four touchdowns this season.

"He's a huge piece of what they do, having a tight end who is not just reliable but is dynamic," Bauer said. "The kid makes plays."

Fifth-year senior wideout DaeSean Hamilton and redshirt sophomore receiver Juwan Johnson have also been bright spots on the offense. Hamilton has caught 22 balls for 366 yards and four touchdowns, while the 6-4, 226-pound Johnson has grabbed 24 passes for 303 yards and the game-winning touchdown at Iowa.

“Johnson has really started to blossom,” Bauer said. “He’s a big, big dude. He’s started to show up in games the way people anticipated he would this year.”

The offensive line is considered the weak spot on offense and has utilized multiple players at right tackle.

“Are they great now? No,” Bauer said. “But it’s light years better than it used to be for Penn State, and it’s certainly above serviceable compared to the rest of the league.”

On the other side of the ball, Penn State’s defense is ranked No. 9 in the country, allowing an average of 285.2 yards per game. They also pace the nation in points allowed (9.0 per game).

“Defensively, they’ve been very, very good,” Bauer said. “No team has eclipsed 20 points on them, 19 from Iowa is the highest that anybody has scored. They swarm to the ball and create turnovers.”

Penn State is No. 2 in the country in turnover margin at plus-12. It has recovered eight fumbles and intercepted nine passes.

“It’s the type of unit defensively that will keep you out of the end zone,” Bauer said. “They will allow you to move the football a little bit — they’re not suffocating — but once you get to the red zone or in the scoring-type area, they really clamp down.”

Bauer said it’s hard to gauge just how good the defense is since it hasn’t seen many good offenses. That may mean the unit has weaknesses teams simply haven’t been able to exploit.

The Nittany Lions will rotate in a number of guys at each position, because they feel like they have guys that are starter quality all across their depth chart.

Senior safety Marcus Allen, senior cornerback Grant Haley and redshirt junior cornerback Amani Oruwariye have all come up with big plays and are leaders on defense.

“I would anticipate that Penn State’s defense will have a ton of success against Michigan’s offense,” Bauer said.

In addition to the defense, special teams have been a key part of the team’s success. Redshirt junior DeAndre Thompkins has been dynamic as a punt returner — he ranks seventh nationally with an average return of 17.1 yards and

has taken one kick back for a touchdown. Sophomore punter Blake Gillikin has been strong as well and ranks 25th in the land with an average of 44.2 yards per attempt. PSU ranks 12th among FBS teams in punt return defense, allowing an average of just 1.29 yards per runback.

“Special teams has been huge for this team this year,” Bauer said. “It’s funny to say that because their place-kicking has been as unreliable as it’s been in recent memory [six of 13 on the year]. But their punting has been phenomenal.”

Bauer said he’s most looking forward to seeing the Penn State offense, which ranks 16th nationally with an average of 39.7 points per game, face off against Michigan’s top-ranked defense.

“I think it’s going to be great, I’m excited to watch it,” Bauer said. “That’s what you want as a person watching football, is to see two competing units who are at the top of their game.”

He picked Penn State to win 31-16.

“I think that Penn State will have opportunities via special teams and on defense to create points,” Bauer said. “I don’t think all 31 of those points will come on offense. Or if they do, it’ll be a direct result of plays made on special teams or defense.”

## Michigan Football Keys To The Game: Penn State

The season is essentially on the line for Michigan in terms of any championship hopes, and the daunting task of running the table starts with a game at No. 2 Penn State.

It’s a night game and a white-out against a motivated team, one that got destroyed last year in a 49-10 loss in Ann Arbor. The Nittany Lions’ turnaround since then, to Big Ten champions last year and now the second-ranked team in the country, has been remarkable. Few would have guessed that U-M would enter this year’s tilt as a 9.5-point underdog, but that’s where the line stands Thursday.

That doesn’t sit well with this Michigan team, cornerbacks coach Mike Zordich (a former Nittany Lions player) said, especially after U-M fell two spots in the polls after a win at Indiana.

“I can understand their frustration,” he said. “They’re part of a really good defense nationally, and they see that they win a game, a lot of teams ahead of

us lose a game and we go backwards. I can see a little chip on their shoulder, absolutely.”

He also sees that they know the implications of the task at hand.

“They understand it’s a big game,” he said. “Coming off the field [Tuesday after practice], on TV they were advertising Michigan versus Penn State, 7:30, a white-out. They know it.

“That’s what’s kind of nice. It’s built in. Hopefully it will help in our preparation.”

### **Here are Michigan’s keys to a victory in Happy Valley Saturday night:**

**Run the ball effectively:** This is where it all starts, and it’s not going to be easy. Penn State will stack the box and dare fifth-year senior John O’Korn to try to beat them ... and that won’t be simple, either.

The good news: Michigan ran the ball for 271 yards against a solid Indiana defense despite the absence of a passing game, and it was a group effort. Junior Karan Higdon showed great vision at times in bouncing it outside, but there was room to run between the tackles, too.

The bad news: PSU is going to be harder to run on, and tougher to move the ball on in general. Opponents have only made it to the red zone 10 times against this defense all year.

Necessary improvement also includes selling play action better when they are running the ball well. O’Korn wasn’t fooling the Hoosiers with his fakes, and that could have opened up at least a bit more room.

**Hit on some bigger plays:** They don’t even have to be huge plays, though it could well take a long throw and catch or a punt/kick return for touchdown to win this one.

Michigan’s receivers have had trouble getting separation, and O’Korn has had difficulty finding them when they do. O’Korn overthrew freshman Donovan Peoples-Jones on what would have been a score at Indiana ... he needs to make that play Saturday night.

U-M had one — *one* — completion that traveled over nine yards through the air at IU, and that was by accident, when O’Korn was running for his life and threw into traffic for 17 yards to Peoples-Jones. The Wolverines will not be able to dink and dunk their way to scores against PSU. They’ll need to have at least a little success downfield ... not an easy task.

**Limit Penn State’s playmakers and make the Nittany Lions’ offense drive the field:** Indiana did this against PSU in the running game, limiting Barkley to 56 yards on 20 carries. His long run was only eight yards, and he actually had negative yardage at halftime.

Where the Hoosiers failed against Penn State was in pass defense. Barkley had a 36-yard reception, and the PSU receivers had a field day, led by DaeSean Hamilton’s nine catches for 122 yards and three touchdowns. Even then, it was Barkley’s kickoff return for touchdown to open the game and two turnovers, including a fumble returned for a touchdown early, that gave Penn State a cushion.

The Wolverines need to make PSU earn everything they get. Any gifts like those the Hoosiers surrendered is a recipe for a loss.

**The Breakdown:** This is a winnable game for the Wolverines, just as every one is because of the stifling defense. The Nittany Lions are obviously playing with much more confidence since last year’s 49-10 beating in Ann Arbor, but their offensive line is suspect. U-M’s defense will be the best unit on the field, and if the offense can score a few times, Michigan could win this game.

It will probably take a few breaks, but stranger things have happened. Heck, we saw it only two weeks ago in Ann Arbor when U-M dropped a 14-10 game to Michigan State.

## News & Views: Harbaugh On Indiana, Penn State

Michigan head coach Jim Harbaugh met the media Monday to preview Penn State and look back at Indiana. We tackle his comments in News & Views format:

**NEWS:** Michigan's defense wilted down the stretch in regulation, but held on in overtime with a great goal-line stand to beat Indiana, 27-20.

**HARBAUGH:** "It was really good. Both [sophomore end] Rashan Gary and [fifth-year senior tackle] Mo Hurst got accolades for the game, linemen of the week, both of them. Mo makes the field goal block. He really played good this week, played good last week.

"The defense, again, is playing really well. You start to stack up some of the things they've done in terms of limiting opponents to total yards. We're one of the Big Ten teams that have allowed 280-some yards or less in their first six ball games since 2000. We have the most punts against us of any team in college football this year, some really great things ... three-and-outs. The team is playing really well on defense."

**VIEWS:** It was great to see the turnovers they weren't able to get the week prior, he added. Sophomore cornerback Lavert Hill and junior safety Tyree Kinnel each picked off passes in the win, and Kinnel's was forced by pressure from redshirt junior defensive end Chase Winovich on the quarterback.

Win the turnover battle, and you usually win the game — it's that simple. Unfortunately, the Wolverines' defense will probably have to get even better in that area given the offensive woes this year. Field position is going to be huge against the better teams on the schedule ... it was even against a marginal MSU squad.

For all the grief he took prior to getting injured, redshirt junior quarterback Wilton Speight is missed.

**NEWS:** Michigan's linebackers played well again Saturday, Harbaugh said,

sophomore Devin Bush Jr. leading the way with eight tackles and fifth-year senior Mike McCray adding four.

**HARBAUGH:** "Both are right up in that seven-, eight-, nine-tackle a game category every week, which you expect them to be. Against a good rushing team in Indiana, limiting them to 80-some yards is really good.

"Also Mike, as you'd expect from a captain, was getting guys in position. ON a critical play in the game, inside the 5-yard line, they were going for the running play, we have a blitz call, and the safety is lined up on the wrong side. Mike was the one that got him aligned correctly, and we were able to negate that run."

**VIEWS:** For whatever reason, some like to minimize McCray's importance on what's been an elite defense, probably because he isn't flashy or nearly as fast as Bush.

What he is, however, is the quarterback of a defense that's destroying opponents this year, and the only thing keeping Michigan from being an average team. As bad as the offense has been at times, the defense has been that good. McCray's a huge part of that.

All the linebackers will be critically important to slowing PSU running back Saquon Barkley Saturday, Harbaugh noted.

"They'll be challenged on a lot of downs," Harbaugh said. "It will be a team effort defensively to go against a great player, a really outstanding offense, a really good quarterback, good receivers, a line and backs that are hitting on all cylinders. The guys are excited for that task."

**NEWS:** Michigan's defense is the Big Ten's best, but Harbaugh said he wouldn't have put that expectation on them.

**HARBAUGH:** "You put an expectation of where you think you're going to be, and you limit the upside. Let's ... get better each day, better today than yesterday, tomorrow than today. It's a simple formula.

"We thought we'd be good. Coach [Don] Brown and our players thought we'd be good. We're playing good, and we're improving."

**VIEWS:** But no way he or anybody else thought they'd be this good with 10 new starters in the lineup. We probably should have, though, given that Brown's defenses were among the nation's best at Boston College, when he had half the talent.

Something to think about going forward for those who don't believe Harbaugh will have U-M playing at a championship level soon enough ... this defense should be outstanding each and every year, and there's no way the offense doesn't improve. Field goal kicking is in great shape, too, and this is a young team.

**NEWS:** Fifth-year senior quarterback John O’Korn has struggled in his last two games, throwing three picks vs. MSU and totaling only 58 yards through the air at Indiana.

**HARBAUGH:** “He’s playing winning football. He’s 2-1, really played the majority of the game at Purdue, and then Indiana and Michigan State. He’s experienced, able to go in and operate well. He came in throwing in the Purdue game and played extremely well.

“This game, no turnovers were huge. We were 100 percent in the red zone, no sacks, avoided the plays that get you beat and that was an emphasis. I thought he did a fine job of that.”

**VIEWS:** He also missed a number of receivers and will need to get through his progressions more often to beat the better teams on the schedule, starting Saturday night. Two conversions on 13 third-down attempts won’t cut it, and the Wolverines are going to have to score some points to win.

That means receivers will need to do a better job getting open, coaches will have to design better routes to get them open, and the line will need to pass block better as well. This is not a one-man problem.

Don’t expect the coaches to open it up and go five-wide all game, however, in Happy Valley.

“We’re playing to win the game. That’s an emphasis every week with our offense,” Harbaugh said. “We want no turnovers, no sacks, no penalties or missed assignments. We’re striving for that perfection. Rarely do you get perfection, but you want to be excellent. That’s what our goals are.”

**NEWS:** Junior Karan Higdon broke out with a 200-yard rushing game at Indiana.

**HARBAUGH:** “Pass protection, instincts, yards after contact [he’s gotten better]. He’s been a tough, balanced runner. I think his balance has improved quite a bit. He’s always been a tough downhill runner. His vision, balance and pass protection have improved. I don’t think he’s hit his ceiling, either. I think he’s an ascending player.”

**VIEWS:** His balance could still be even a bit better. He still stumbles at times in getting ahead of himself.

And yet he showed burst we haven’t seen much this year against a solid Indiana defense. He has earned the right to start, and his play could be one of the keys to the last six games of the season, especially if the Wolverines remain dedicated to the run (as expected).

**NEWS:** The offensive line went back to the basics vs. Indiana, more isolation and power runs than zone.

**HARBAUGH:** “There were good things with the offensive line, and still we’re not humming on all cylinders. There’s still growth to be had, and we’re chasing it ... We’re really trying to go perfect individually and as a unit. We haven’t done that yet. No team has, but we want higher excellence individually and collectively.

“I wouldn’t use the word ‘dominated.’ That was an outstanding run defense we played, a really a good defense altogether. Where we are in forcing three-and-outs, No. 2 [nationally], Indiana is No. 3. I feel like there is more improvement to be had and we can play even better.”

**VIEWS:** And again, they’ll need to in order to win Saturday and going forward. Eliminating mental mistakes is a start. There are still too many per game. However, 271 yards rushing against Indiana is something on which to build.

## Wolverine Watch: A Run At Ruining A Reckoning

Penn State won the war in 2016, clearly. The Nittany Lions somehow, some way, came out on top in the Big Ten Conference.

In one particular battle, though, the Nittany Lions looked like an MMA fighter after a battle in handcuffs and ankle irons. They hobbled into Michigan Stadium with a linebacking corps decimated by injuries. They crawled out shackled to a 49-10 loss.

The easiest \$110,319 anyone could have ever earned would have involved betting every single individual exiting Michigan Stadium that afternoon — whether garbed in blue and white or maize and blue — one dollar that Penn State would become Big Ten champs a couple of months down the road.

No way. No chance. No how.

Back in Happy Valley, more than a few unhappy folks were insisting Penn State head coach James Franklin might be gone after the season. After the beat-down, his chances looked deader than Ben Franklin.

Don’t think for a second the Nittany Lions, and their fans, don’t remember. That could prove a problem come Saturday night, when the Wolverines slip hopefully into Beaver Stadium.

Like Doc Holliday once said in “Tombstone” — “Make no mistake. It’s not revenge he’s after. It’s a reckoning.”

Penn State fans aren’t exactly fond of Michigan anyway, which doesn’t make them unique. But the Joe Pa Loompas honed their revved-up revulsion for the

Wolverines through an 0-9 streak a few years back, when they convinced themselves the league had it in for them.

Michigan always seemed to find a way, and the vanilla lids discovered a new level of disdain.

It's different now. The Wolverines lost their aura of invincibility via their walk in the wilderness during the post-Lloyd Carr era. Penn State has been gaining momentum, after nearly falling off a cliff.

The Nittany Lions are defending Big Ten champs, double-digit favorites over the visitors, armed with two of the top offensive players in the league in quarterback Trace McSorley and tailback Saquon Barkley. They feature the No. 1 defense in the nation against the score.

In terms of settling scores, the Fighting Franklins appear overqualified.

"They're going to come out a little bit extra intense," observed fifth-year senior defensive tackle Maurice Hurst Jr. "I think they're going to really bring it.

"That's what makes this such an exciting game. They have a lot of motivation from last year. They won the Big Ten championship, but we got the better of them ... I feel like they're really going to come out ready to play."

It's not that Michigan won't. After all, the Wolverines come in dragging a still-soaked loss to Michigan State, and one defeat away from encountering polite smiles and silence when they insist they're not out of the league race.

They've got their own killer defense and a confident running back in junior Karan Higdon fresh off a 200-yard game at Indiana.

But they don't have the home crowd, a consistent passing attack or much of a record versus ranked opponents in true road games lately. At No. 2, Penn State is about as ranked as they come.

"We've been pretty bad on the road since I've been here," Hurst acknowledged, noting the importance of first steps at Purdue and Indiana. "Just to know you can go on the road and get those wins, grind out those tough games and come out on top, it really forms your identity as a team."

Fifth-year senior quarterback John O'Korn's mom works as a waitress in State College. It's a safe bet she's not going to get any tips from the locals on how to upend the Nittany Lions for a third straight season under Jim Harbaugh.

O'Korn thinks he knows part of the solution, anyway. He insists he has to get better, improving in conjunction with a host of young receivers.

"Our run game is rolling, our defense is rolling," he said. "It's on us as a unit, quarterbacks and receivers."

The smart money whispers, don't bet The Big House. The residents thereof insist, we're showing up.

"I look at it as just another game we have to win," sophomore linebacker Devin Bush Jr. offered. "We're playing a good team in their environment. It's no different to us."

"I'm really excited," O'Korn added. "I think everybody on our team will tell you the same thing. Everybody is fired up. Obviously, we're an underdog in the game. Nobody's really giving us a chance, so we're excited for the opportunity."

Nobody's giving them a chance — just like they didn't Penn State, on its way out of Ann Arbor a year ago.

## By The Numbers: Michigan's Defense Has Been Even Better Than Last Year's

After Michigan lost 10 starters off of last year's defense that finished tied with Alabama as the nation's best (261.8 yards allowed per game), everyone assumed this season's squad would inevitably take a step back.

However, that hasn't been the case. In fact, this year's group has actually been better.

There are obviously still six games to play in 2017, but U-M has better statistical numbers in almost all of the major defensive categories than last year's defense had.

### A Comparison Of Michigan's 2016 And 2017 Defensive Statistics

Perhaps the most impressive statistic on the entire table resides in the yards allowed per game category.

Michigan's defense is surrendering 223.8 yards per game this season, which is 38 fewer than last year's final national-leading mark of 261.8.

Another impressive aspect of this season's unit is how stout the secondary has been. Last year's group — which was made up of four seniors in cornerbacks Jourdan Lewis and Channing Stribling, along with safeties Delano Hill and Dymonte Thomas — finished with the best pass defense in the country, allowing just 142.5 yards per game through the air.

All four aforementioned players graduated and are drawing NFL paychecks. Back in Ann Arbor, three of this year's starters — sophomore cornerbacks Lavert Hill and David Long and sophomore safety Josh Metellus — were forced to step in, despite having little previous game experience.

Yet, they've somehow been even better than last year's bunch was. The 2017 squad is allowing just 138 yards per game through the air, which is currently the

third-fewest in the nation.

The rush defense is also significantly better this campaign than last, which is also incredible when considering the players who departed.

Michigan lost Chris Wormley, Taco Charlton and Ryan Glasgow off of last season's defensive line, and all of them were drafted within the first four rounds of the NFL Draft. The 2016 front seven additionally lost Jabrill Peppers and Ben Gedeon from the linebacking corps, with both also going in the first four rounds of the draft.

Sophomores Devin Bush Jr. and Khaleke Hudson have stepped in and performed incredibly well in Gedeon's and Peppers' vacated spots, respectively.

Sophomore defensive end Rashan Gary, fifth-year senior defensive tackle Maurice Hurst Jr., redshirt junior defensive tackle Bryan Mone and redshirt junior defensive end Chase Winovich comprise this year's new-look defensive line, and the unit hasn't missed a beat.

While Penn State's offense — Michigan's next opponent — has been electric so far this season (456.2 yards per game to rank 33rd nationally), it hasn't faced a defense like Michigan's unit.

In fact, the best defense it has faced this year has been Indiana's, which ranks just 39th in the nation. Every other defense it has faced checks in 59th or lower, and three rank 77th or worse.

### BY THE NUMBERS: MICHIGAN AT PENN STATE

**1st & 8th** Is where Michigan and Penn State rank in all-time college football wins, respectively. The Wolverines have won 940 contests throughout their history, while the Nittany Lions have won 873.

**1** Loss for Penn State since last season's 49-10 drubbing at Michigan Sept. 24. The Nittany Lions have posted a 15-1 record since that point, with the lone loss coming at the hands of USC, 52-49, in last year's Rose Bowl.

**2nd** Biggest stadium in the country Michigan will play at on Saturday night when it travels to Happy Valley. Beaver Stadium seats 106,572 people, while Michigan Stadium officially holds 107,601.

**5** Of the last 10 meetings between Michigan and Penn State have been decided by seven points or fewer, dating back to 2002. Perhaps the most memorable game in that span came in 2005, when Wolverine quarterback Chad Henne threw a 10-yard touchdown pass to receiver Mario Manningham with no time left on the clock to give the Maize and Blue a 27-25 victory.

**13-7** All-time series advantage for Michigan over Penn State. The Nittany Lions actually won three of the first four meetings from 1993-1996, before the

Wolverines ripped off nine straight from 1997-2007.

**200** Rushing yards for junior running back Karan Higdon in last week's 27-20 overtime win at Indiana. Higdon became the first U-M player to rush for 200 yards in a game since quarterback Denard Robinson did so against Purdue in 2012, and the first running back to do so since Mike Hart against Eastern Michigan in 2007.

**Nov. 21, 2015** Was the last time Penn State lost a home contest. Michigan defeated the Nittany Lions during their annual whiteout game in Happy Valley that day, 28-16. Saturday night will not only be a whiteout, but ESPN's College GameDay will be broadcasting its weekly pregame show from State College.

## CB Coach Mike Zordich Sees Lavert Hill, Jourdan Lewis Comparison

Michigan sophomore cornerback Lavert Hill has had a breakout season, having become one of the Big Ten's best cover corners in his first year as a starter. Junior safety Tyree Kinnel has gone so far as to compare him to Dallas Cowboys rookie and former Wolverine All-American Jourdan Lewis.

Quarterbacks have posted an 18.6 passer rating against Hill this year, indicating true dominance.

"I can see what Tyree is seeing," cornerbacks coach Mike Zordich said. "Lavert has started to come out of his shell a little bit. I can see his fieriness, his competitiveness more and more in practice as the year goes.

"He's starting to mature. He's starting to understand he can be a really good football player. It's just that process of every day staying on him, staying on them all, helping them all grow up and understand the game."

Hill appears to have taken the next step in trying to pick passes off rather than just knock them down. He had one fourth-quarter interception Saturday on which he high pointed the ball down the sideline, and he had another called back that probably shouldn't have been.

"He's very natural, very instinctive," Zordich said. "He'll do whatever he can do to get hands on it. I think he's always looking for a pick, but if he can't he will try to slap it or backhand it away. He's just instinctive in that way.

"I think he's ahead of the curve a little bit. We saw it. That's the reason why we recruited him. It was great to have him here in the spring [before his fresh-

man year]. You could see he could just do some things. He's applying it now to everyday activities on a consistent basis."

### NOTES

- Count Zordich among those who didn't see any pass interference on Hill's first pick against Indiana.

"I was astonished. I actually asked the official at halftime what happened—what did he do?" Zordich said. "He said he tugged on his top shoulder and that was able to slingshot him in front, but you look at it on film and you don't see that.

"You just see the kid making a hell of a play. I was surprised."

Michigan's other corners have elevated their play, too, Zordich said.

"[Sophomore] David Long has progressed well, [redshirt junior] Brandon Watson has progressed well. Yes, we're happy, but we still need to progress," the coach noted. "[Freshman] Ambry Thomas is coming along. He had to go in there because David got dinged up in there, a little dizzy, but Ambry is coming. So is [freshman Ben St-Juste]. Both those guys are working extremely hard.

"I would say if they keep up this pace, in a couple weeks I wouldn't be afraid to put them in more than what we're seeing now."

- Zordich is pleased with the way his group has played the run this year.

"So far, so good," he said. "For all the man [coverage] we play, they're not run off a lot. They're seeing it and they're able to fit.

"Lavert had two or three tackles for loss the last couple games, so he's seeing it. David Long made a huge play in the Michigan State game coming off a man and stopping a third-down play. They're seeing it, which is good."

- Penn State's receivers will be the best U-M has faced this year as a group, Zordich said. Star running back Saquon Barkley leads the team with 29 receptions for 395 yards, but he is supplemented out wide by fifth-year senior DaeSean Hamilton (24 catches for 366 yards and four touchdowns), redshirt sophomore Juwan Johnson (24 receptions for 303 yards and one score), redshirt junior DeAndre Thompkins (16 grabs for 190 yards) and senior Saeed Blacknall (nine catches for 162 yards and one touchdown).

"I'd put them with the Florida group, but maybe just a notch ahead, because all four of them are pretty good, pretty fluid downfield," he said.

Quarterback Trace McSorley also is playing at a high level.

"Really, he's pretty much the same guy. I'm watching all this film, and he still



likes to run,” Zordich said. “He likes to get out of the pocket. He’s a lot like the last two guys we faced.

“In a sense it’s been helpful playing MSU, Indiana with a quarterback that likes to get out of the pocket and run. He is the same guy I think from a year ago. He’s a competitor ... a great competitor.”

- Michigan plastered the Nittany Lions 49-10 last year, and Zordich said he was still surprised by that outcome.

“I really did not expect that big a margin of victory,” he said. “They had some very key injuries on the defensive side of the ball, and then the linebacker gets kicked out of the game for targeting, and it wasn’t targeting. You could see the whole team just kind of deflate a little bit.

“That’s certainly not going to be the case this weekend. It’s going to be a great game, great battle. I think it will be a fun game for the nation to see.”

PSU is moving the ball well with many of the same faces from last year’s offense.

“They’re just confident,” Zordich said. “Coach [James] Franklin has done a hell of a job just getting them confident. You look at our game after last year and would have thought they were done. They ended up running the table. They’ve got confidence ... confidence helps a lot, and they all have it. It’s showed. They’re playing well. Playing very hard.

“I think you’re going to see a good game ... a very competitive game.”

## Around The Big Ten: Week Eight

The Wolverine takes a look around the Big Ten heading into the eighth week of action:

### Illinois (2-4, 0-3 Big Ten)

Illinois heads to Minnesota this weekend, hoping to bounce back from its embarrassing home loss to Rutgers last week ... The Illini hold a dismal 2-10 record in their last 10 road games, dating back to 2015 ... Illinois has started 14 freshmen throughout the course of this season, which is more than any other team in the nation ... Only three of the Illini’s last 26 losses (dating back to 2014) have come by nine points or fewer ... Freshman receiver Ricky Smalling’s 19.4 yards per catch are the most in the Big Ten.

### Indiana (3-3, 0-3 Big Ten)

Indiana travels to No. 18 Michigan State this weekend in search of its first conference win ... The victor will receive the Old Brass Spitoon trophy, which has been awarded to the game’s winner since 1950 ... The Hoosier defense has forced an average of seven three-and-outs per game, which is the second-best mark nationally ... Redshirt junior receiver Luke Timian’s 95 yards last week against Michigan were a career high ... Redshirt junior wideout Simmie Cobbs’ 37 receptions are the second most in the Big Ten, and his 68.2 yards per game rank fourth.

### Iowa (4-2, 1-2 Big Ten)

Coming off a bye week, Iowa hits the road for Northwestern ... The Hawkeyes have impressively outscored opponents 70-20 in the fourth quarter this season ... Iowa has dominated the series with the Wildcats — which began in 1897 — holding a 50-25-3 advantage ... Fifth-year senior linebacker Josey Jewell’s 70 tackles are 16 more than any other player in the Big Ten and are tied for seventh nationally.

### Maryland (3-3, 1-2 Big Ten)

Losers of three of its last four, Maryland travels to Madison to face No. 5 Wisconsin ... Junior receiver D.J. Moore posted career highs in catches (12) and receiving yards (210) in last week’s 37-21 loss to Northwestern ... Moore leads the Big Ten in all of the major receiving statistics — catches (44), touchdowns (seven) and yards per game (104) ... Sophomore quarterback Max Bortenschlager has thrown 83 straight passes without an interception, which is the longest streak for a Terrapin quarterback since Chris Turner threw 132 straight in 2008.

### No. 18 Michigan State (5-1, 3-0 Big Ten)

No. 18 Michigan State hosts Indiana this weekend ... Fifth-year senior running back Gerald Holmes missed last week’s win at Minnesota with injury ... MSU leads the all-time series with the Hoosiers 45-16-2 ... Redshirt sophomore defensive end Kenny Willekes’ eight tackles for loss are the fourth most in the league.

### Minnesota (3-3, 0-3 Big Ten)

Hoping to snap its three-game losing streak, Minnesota welcomes Illinois to Minneapolis ... After redshirt sophomore quarterback Demry Croft nearly led the team to a come-from-behind victory over Michigan State last weekend, it is unclear whether he or fifth-year senior Conor Rhoda will get the start ... The Gophers hold an impressive 8-3 record in their last 11 home games since the start of last year ... Sophomore receiver Tyler Johnson’s 78.7 yards per game are the third most in the conference, while his 18.8 yards per catch are second most.

### Northwestern (3-3, 1-2 Big Ten)

Northwestern looks to turn its season around when it hosts Iowa this weekend ... Senior running back Justin Jackson became the Wildcats’ all-time leading rusher (4,639 yards) after his 171-yard effort last week at Maryland, passing Damien Anderson in the record books ... Rookie kicker Charlie Kuhbander was named Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week after he became the first freshman kicker in school history to make three field goals in a game ... Northwestern

will be looking to win consecutive regular-season games for the first time since defeating Michigan State and Indiana on Oct. 15 and 22, respectively, last year.

### No. 2 Penn State (6-0, 3-0 Big Ten)

No. 2 Penn State hosts No. 19 Michigan in a major primetime showdown ... The Nittany Lions have not lost a home game since falling to the Wolverines on Nov. 21, 2015 ... Redshirt junior quarterback Trace McSorley has thrown at least one touchdown pass in 21 consecutive games ... Penn State leads the nation in scoring defense (9.0 points allowed per game), while Michigan leads the country in total defense (223.8 yards surrendered per contest) ... ESPN's College GameDay will make its first trip to Happy Valley since 2009.

### Purdue (3-3, 1-2 Big Ten)

Already halfway to bowl eligibility, Purdue travels to Rutgers ... Despite being conference foes since 2014, this will be the schools' first-ever meeting ... Saturday's game will be the first noon kickoff of the season for the Boilermakers; every other Big Ten team has played at least one noon game so far ... A victory would give Purdue its second road win of the season, something it has not done since 2012.

### Rutgers (2-4, 1-2 Big Ten)

Coming off its 35-24 victory at Illinois last week, Rutgers heads home to host Purdue ... Last Saturday's conference road victory was just the third for the Scarlet Knights since they joined the Big Ten in 2014 ... In his first game since being moved from receiver to safety, redshirt sophomore Jawuan Harris tallied a game-high 11 tackles, forced a fumble and picked off a pass ... Rutgers will be seeking back-to-back Big Ten victories for the first time ever.

### No. 5 Wisconsin (6-0, 3-0 Big Ten)

No. 5 Wisconsin hopes to keep its undefeated season alive when it welcomes Maryland to Madison ... A victory would give the Badgers their first 7-0 start since 2004 ... After rushing for 219 yards last week against Purdue, freshman running back Jonathan Taylor was named Big Ten Freshman of the Week for the third time in six games ... Fifth-year senior linebacker Leon Jacobs was tabbed as the conference's Defensive Player of the Week after he recorded a fourth-quarter interception in the red zone during last week's narrow 17-9 victory over Purdue.

- **Ben Braden** (2013-16), OG, New York Jets: Made 3-3 New York's practice squad as an undrafted free agent.
- **Tom Brady** (1996-99), QB, New England Patriots: Completed 20 of 38 passes for 257 yards with two touchdowns and an interception in a 24-17 win at the New York Jets ... Has connected on 153 of 233 attempts for 1,959 yards with 13 touchdowns and two picks for the 4-2 Patriots ... Leads the NFL in passing yardage, is tied for second in touchdowns and ranks second in passer rating (106.9) ... Brady also set the NFL record for regular-season wins with the victory, surpassing Peyton Manning and Brett Favre (186) ... In a recent ESPN survey of 155 NFL players, they still think the 40-year-old Brady will win the most Super Bowls over the next 10 years; he nudged out the Raiders' Derek Carr with 21 percent of the vote (to Carr's 20 percent).
- **Alan Branch** (2004-06), DT, New England Patriots: Notched one tackle in a 24-17 win at the New York Jets ... Has played in five of six games for the 4-2 Patriots, starting one, and recorded three solo stops.

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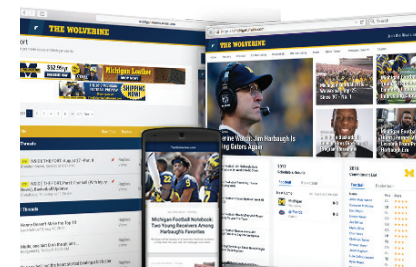
