Previewing Michigan at Indiana With Hoosiers Insider

Michigan has not lost back-to-back games in the regular season under Jim Harbaugh and is hoping to keep that streak going this weekend when the Wolverines travel to Bloomington, Ind., to take on the Hoosiers.

No. 17 Michigan (4-1) fell at home to Michigan State 14-10 last week, while Indiana (3-2) comes off a 27-0 victory against Charleston Southern — a game that was scheduled last month after the team's game against Florida International was canceled due to Hurricane Irma.

Led by new coach Tom Allen, who was hired after Kevin Wilson was fired for alleged mistreatment of injured players, Indiana has much more of a defensive focus than the teams of previous years that were known for high-scoring offenses and Swiss cheese-like defense.

Indiana has knocked off Virginia on the road, and Georgia Southern and Charleston Southern at home, while it has lost to both Ohio State (at home) and Penn State (on the road).

"The strength is definitely the defense," TheHoosier.com's Taylor Lehman said. "They're second in the nation in forcing three-and-outs (6.8 per game), and they've already played Ohio State and Penn State, so the cards were kind of

stacked against them early in that regard."

The defense ranks No. 47 in the country for yards allowed per game (357.8) and is ranked No. 22 in the nation according to the S&P+ ratings.

The defense features two standout players that have NFL futures, senior linebacker Tegray Scales and fifth-year senior Rashard Fant.

Scales was a Sports Illustrated second-team All-American and led the country with 23.5 tackles for loss in 2016. He led the Big Ten in tackles last year, with 126, and has six career interceptions.

This season, he leads Indiana in tackles, sacks and tackles for loss this season with 42, 3.5 and 6.5, respectively.

"Tegray Scales does a lot that doesn't show up on the scoresheet," Lehman added. "He's looked really, really good. He had three sacks against Penn State."

Fant is the leader in the secondary. He has led the Big Ten and been No. 2 nationally in pass breakups each of the past two seasons. He also notched three interceptions in 2016.

This year, he is being thrown at less. Lehman says Indiana's secondary is the strength of the team.

Charleston Southern did not complete a pass against the Hoosiers last week.

Despite the defensive improvements, Allen wants more turnovers from his defenders. Indiana ranks last in the Big Ten in turnover margin, with Michigan second-to-last. The Hoosiers have turned the ball over 11 times (five interceptions, six fumbles) and recorded just four on defense (one pick, three fumbles).

"Tom Allen's defenses are usually better about forcing turnovers, and they haven't really done that this year," Lehman said.

Junior safety Jonathan Crawford has the lone interception, which came against Penn State.

The Hoosiers play a number of different guys on the defensive line which Lehman says has been fine up the middle but needs to be better on the edge. They have 14 sacks as a team, which is tied for 24th nationally with an average of 2.8 per game.

"They have more of a rotation because they have so many guys that are at about the same talent level," Lehman said.

The defense could be hurt by injuries as well. Sophomore husky Marcelino Ball, sophomore cornerback A'Shon Riggins and fifth-year senior defensive tackle Nate Hoff are all questionable to play and are major components of the

defense. Hoff is more likely to play than Ball or Riggins.

On offense, Indiana is led by redshirt freshman quarterback Peyton Ramsey, who took the job away from fifth-year senior Richard Lagow earlier this season.

He is 61-of-89 passing for 637 yards, six touchdowns and two interceptions this season. Ramsey is also a threat on the ground, which is part of what separated him from Lagow, who is more of a pocket passer. He's run 49 times for 171 yards and two scores, and is Indiana's second-leading rusher.

"Peyton Ramsey has shown some ability to move the ball," Lehman said. "But he hasn't really had to against really good defenses. Penn State has a good defense but not as good as Michigan's."

Freshman running back Morgan Ellison seems to have taken a hold on the backfield duties, carrying the ball 69 times for 358 yards and two touchdowns. He capitalized on the opportunity when junior Mike Majette got injured. Majette is still officially listed as the starter, but Ellison took the field first last week with both players active.

Former Michigan star Mike Hart is Indiana's running back's coach. He's not the only former Wolverine on staff either — Mike DeBord is the offensive coordinator and Nick Sheridan is the team's quarterback's coach.

Indiana has what is generally considered one of the best wide receiving groups in the Big Ten, led by 6-4 redshirt junior Simmie Cobbs.

Cobbs has torched opposing defenses this season and has 33 catches for 370 yards and three touchdowns. Fans might recognize his name from the season opener, where he had 11 catches for 149 yards and a score against Ohio State.

"Simmie Cobbs is an NFL receiver," Lehman said. "His size and speed [are impressive], and the way he's able to gel with multiple quarterbacks on the roster — he doesn't need to have one quarterback to find success. He's one of those guys that's just difficult for any cornerback to cover."

Redshirt junior Luke Timian will catch passes out of the slot, while redshirt freshman Taysir Mack and junior Donovan Hale will both be on the outside. Hale is questionable to play with an injury. There's a strong chance he won't be able to go.

The Hoosiers could, however, get senior tight end Ian Thomas back from injury this week. He's caught 16 balls for 254 yards and three touchdowns to rank second on the team in receiving yards.

"Tom Allen is optimistic about him retuning from injury," Lehman said. "That's a huge passing threat and something that IU hasn't had — a big receiving tight end." Lehman said he thinks Indiana will try to spread out the defense with short, quick passes. The offensive line is weak, and the Michigan defense is going to get home.

"If they can get the linebackers out of the box, maybe there's a chance they can stop a four-man rush from Michigan," Lehman said. "But if there's any blitzing, I don't see IU's offensive line being able to stop them. The experience isn't there, they're just really young."

The scribe noted the line has improved in recent weeks after a slow start, but there just aren't many teams that can handle Michigan's front seven.

"The teams are very parallel, it's just that Michigan has more talent that IU does," Lehman said.

He thinks Indiana will turn the ball over three times and that Michigan will get a 27-17 win.

"There is a bit of a buzz [in Bloomington]," Lehman said. "A lot of people see Michigan as a vulnerable No. 17 team right now."

Michigan Football Keys To The Game: Indiana

Michigan gave one away against Michigan State, turning the ball over five times, and now faces a solid Indiana team on the road.

A second loss would end any hopes of a Big Ten title ... dreams that seem farfetched, regardless, given the Wolverines' woes on offense. Indiana is a capable team, but this is a game Michigan should win (of course, the same applied last week, and the Wolverines failed that test miserably).

Indiana will run tempo against Michigan, a different test for the defense, so depth will be important this weekend. As for the offense — IU's defense is solid, so this is a true road test.

Last week, we wrote that Michigan needed to protect the quarterback, contain the opposing QB and 'don't give it away.' The Wolverines failed on two of three and were average, at best, in containing MSU's Brian Lewerke. Here's what they need to do to win this week:

Protect the ball: For God's sake, protect the ball. The Wolverines are now 110th in the country (out of 129 teams) in turnover margin this year (minus-1.0 per game), and most of that is on the offense. The defense is middle of the pack, No. 79 nationally in takeaways (seven), but there are zero complaints here about what defensive coordinator Don Brown's group is doing on that side of the ball.

Michigan turned it over five times against Michigan State and still only lost by four. You probably won't find another game between Power Five conference teams half that close with that margin. The worst part — the Spartans were in the bottom 10 nationally in turnovers gained before playing Michigan, and now they're 46th after the five takeaways against the Wolverines (giving them nine for the year).

Fumbles and interceptions lose games. Period. If they continue, U-M is bound to drop a few more.

Scheme around their weaknesses: It's hard, of course, to coach around poor offensive line play, but it's not the entire line that's giving the Michigan offense fits. Sophomore right guard Mike Onwenu has been steadily improving, but right tackle remains a significant issue ... and yet there wasn't much done to protect them against MSU. Sliding some protections that way when U-M must throw — either a running back or a tight end to help — would be a start.

Putting fifth-year senior John O'Korn in better positions to succeed would be another boost. O'Korn has a hard time making it past his first read, and doesn't do well in the pocket on the rare occasion he has a pocket. He can move a bit, though. Using him the way Michigan State uses Brian Lewerke might be an option and certainly a little more innovation. Where were the jet sweeps, play action, etc. against the Spartans? Our unofficial numbers credited U-M with just four play-action completions for 36 yards.

One last thing — it's also hard to scheme around turnovers. U-M was on its way to taking control before fifth-year senior Ty Isaac's fumble changed the game late in the first quarter. So again, protect the ball.

Win special teams: Getting more out of the return game would be one way for the Wolverines to help the offense. Field position has been an issue this year, in large part because the punt and kick return games (with one exception freshman Donovan Peoples-Jones' punt return for TD against Air Force) have not been very good. Michigan is 99th in the country in kick returns, averaging 18.5 yards per runback.

U-M's coverage, however, has been stellar, and it will need to be again this week. Indiana is sixth in the country, averaging 17.69 yards per punt return. This is a big week for freshman punter Brad Robbins, who has steadily improved the last two weeks. A low, short one could result in a big play and put more pressure on a struggling Michigan offense.

Make the Hoosiers earn their points against a stifling Michigan defense.

The Breakdown: We said it last week — if Michigan protects the ball, it probably wins comfortably. Five turnovers to none and a second-half monsoon made it paramount to protect the ball and have the lead when the rains came, and that's what happened ... only Michigan State was the team that accomplished it. It was reminiscent, crazily enough, of a 1987, 14-10 loss in Bloomington that head coach Bo Schembechler called "a mistake."

The season is not lost. This offense just needs to be adequate for this to be a very good football team, given the excellence on defense. The Wolverines could have beaten the Spartans had it just been bad.

Jim Harbaugh is too good a football coach to let this fester, and it's time for him to do what it takes to put the offense in positions to succeed, even if it means playing more conservatively.

Michigan Football News & Views: Jim Harbaugh Monday Presser

Michigan head coach Jim Harbaugh met the media Monday to talk MSU and Indiana. Here's our take on his comments:

NEWS: Redshirt junior quarterback Wilton Speight will miss several more games before he returns.

HARBAUGH: "Multiple weeks. I don't know if he'll be out for the year."

VIEWS: He also confirmed there are some "cracks" in the signal-caller's vertebrae.

This is a bigger blow than most believe, including those who thought fifthyear senior John O'Korn was the better option, regardless. Make no mistake ... O'Korn deserved the start after playing well at Purdue, but there is a reason Speight was starting and part of it was better decision making.

O'Korn is better at eluding pressure, but he's still a 'gunslinger' who takes off too soon. He had three picks against Michigan State, leading to Michigan's 5-0 deficit in turnovers last week ... well, that was one of the big differences in the game.

U-M needs Speight back as soon as possible, and no matter who is behind center, the line, the tight ends and the running backs need to do a better job blocking for them. It's been poor.

Harbaugh confirmed O'Korn would be his quarterback going forward over redshirt freshman Brandon Peters.

"We'll go through it, make corrections, make improvements and we'll move on," he said.

NEWS: Junior running back Karan Higdon provided a spark in the running game, averaging 5.4 yards per rush. Harbaugh was questioned why he didn't run him more.

HARBAUGH: "Karan played well. You want to question the play calling ... that usually is the case when something doesn't work.

"What I want to do is look at the film. I'll learn from it. I'm not going to get into questioning the play calling. It's a very convenient thing, right? It's a very easy thing to do. If the play worked, hey it was a great play because it worked. If the play doesn't work, would you wish you had done something else, a different play call? Sure. It's very easy to do." VIEWS: He mentioned hindsight being 20/20, and he's right in a sense. A third-and-three draw play to sophomore Chris Evans in the fourth quarter, for example, looked like a bad call, especially since the weather had cleared up a bit.

"We run a third-down draw against Florida, it works ... great play. We call a play that doesn't work ... would you wish a different play?" Harbaugh said. "It's a very easy thing to do.

"I think that's what people do. It's just a fact of what anybody does ... 'Should have thrown it or should have run it.' If you threw it and it didn't work, you wish you would have run it. As a coach you go through it, look at where you can make corrections and where you can make improvements."

He's right. It's a chess match, and they got beat on that play.

The bigger issue would be going empty backfield on third down in a monsoon, etc., and not being able to scheme some plays (like the screen pass MSU scored on for its second touchdown).

Something's off, and it needs to be fixed.

"We call the plays together as a staff," Harbaugh said. "The final say \dots I have that on the play calling."

NEWS: Michigan ranks near the bottom of the conference in several offensive categories and seems to lack an identity.

HARBAUGH: "We're in the process of [developing one]. We had a ball game that stuff happens. Things happen. We had fumbles, turnovers ... we had things that just occur. A shotgun snap to their quarterback who fumbles it and picks up a critical first down.

"Things happen during a course of a game, and you don't know why they're happening but they keep happening. That's where you go back and learn from it, look at it, make corrections and move on with the mindset of not letting it happen again."

VIEWS: But it shouldn't happen against a rival, especially the turnovers, which have been a problem all year. Take away two drive-ending fumbles in MSU territory and the Wolverines might have escaped with a win in a game in which they played terribly.

But the bounces were not in their favor, as he noted. That's why it's important to play clean games against decent football teams ... so the back isn't against the wall when the weather moves in, etc.

NEWS: Redshirt junior Juwann Bushell-Beatty replaced redshirt sophomore Nolan Ulizio at right tackle during the game.

HARBAUGH: "I can understand the quarterback question and quarterback controversy, but I would never really discuss a right tackle, guard or center controversy. But yes, we'll look at that during the week."

VIEWS: Neither player appears to be the answer, so it will be interesting to see if, say, redshirt sophomore John Runyan Jr. gets a look on the right side this week. Why he hasn't is a mystery, but this staff isn't stupid ... there must be a reason, and they are going to play whoever gives them the best chance to win.

Right now, however, poor blocking, particularly on that side, is costing them any chance for sustained offensive success.

NEWS: The defense held Michigan State in check in the second half, but the offense couldn't get it done. Harbaugh said there was no finger pointing going on.

HARBAUGH: "I don't sense that ... we're not frustrated. We look forward to getting back today and doing everything on both sides of the ball and special teams to contribute to a victory. We're fortunate to have an opponent to play this week, and opportunities ahead of us."

VIEWS: He's not frustrated either, he said ... just ready to get back to work.

But there has to be some frustration. He has a championship-level defense and just lost to a mediocre rival at home because of the offense. If they want to accomplish anything this year, they need to figure something out. And now.

It's possible ... look at Penn State's turnaround last year, for example. U-M doesn't have the same horses on offense, obviously, but the offense just needs to be decent for this team to be good. That's not too much to ask.

NEWS: Harbaugh dropped to 1-4 against Michigan State and Ohio State with Saturday's loss, but he insisted they do put an emphasis on those games.

HARBAUGH: "The record is what the record is. I'm well aware of what the record is. Against MSU and OSU we're 1-4. The record against all other opponents is 23-3. We know what the records are.

"We want to win those games. We want to win every game we're playing. We want to win them all. Most importantly, we want to win this one, our next game."

VIEWS: It is what it is, and media will have a field day with it because of all the attention Harbaugh demands. And no, it's not good enough.

But Harbaugh is a break, or a better call or two, away from being 3-2 (MSU punt game in 2015, OSU last year), and those things tend to even out. If the football gods were just, Saturday's Hail Mary as time expired would have been completed to make up for the 2015 punt game fluke.

This year's game shouldn't have come down to that, of course. U-M didn't match MSU's intensity and gave it away with five turnovers. It's the second time in five rivalry contests that the Wolverines didn't rise to the game (OSU 2015 being the first), and that needs to end.

NEWS: Indiana is 3-2 with its only losses to Ohio State and Penn State.

HARBAUGH: "This is a very good football team. We've had very competitive games with them. I think they've played very well and are playing very good this year, especially at home ... that's what we're doing today, making those preparations."

VIEWS: The spread is 5.5 points, so it's certainly no gimme, especially with the Wolverines' offensive woes. This is a game Michigan can't afford to lose ... it says here they rise to the occasion.

Indiana's Trio Of Former Wolverines Say This Week Is Strictly Business

A trio of former Wolverines lead the offensive attack at Indiana this season.

Offensive coordinator Mike DeBord, running backs coach Mike Hart and quarterbacks coach Nick Sheridan were all hired this past offseason by Tom Allen after he took over as head coach at IU.

DeBord, who has held a variety of roles with Michigan from 1993-99 and then again from 2004-07, including two stints directing the offense, was Tennessee's offensive coordinator the past two seasons before being lured to Bloomington.

Hart is one of the best running backs the Maize and Blue have ever had, rushing for 5,040 yards from 2004-07 — a Michigan program record.

Sheridan played at Michigan from 2006-09. He played in 12 games at quarterback, and threw for 701 yards and two touchdowns in his career, while rushing for 103 yards and a score.

Despite all of the U-M connections, the three haven't let the fact that the Wolverines are the next opponent get in the way of their preparation.

"We really haven't talked about it as a group," DeBord said. "When you get into a season and get into game preparation, we have a routine that we're following and all the coaches individually have been watching game film.

"We obviously have talked a lot about their defense, but we just don't have the time to sit around and talk about old times."

DeBord said he wanted Hart and Sheridan at Indiana with him because he knows they're loyal to him and that's something he values as a coach.

"When Nick and Mike came here, I obviously told them why I wanted them here," the veteran coach said. "It went back to those Michigan days."

Sheridan was a graduate assistant at Tennessee under DeBord, and oversaw quarterback Josh Dobbs and his rise. Dobbs was selected in the fourth round of the NFL Draft this past year by the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Hart has coached at Eastern Michigan, Western Michigan and was at Syracuse last season. It won't be the first time he's had to coach against his alma mater.

"It's definitely business," Hart said. "It's not my first time playing against them as a coach, my first coaching job at Eastern Michigan we played against them. It's business, I think it affects everyone else on the outside more than it affects us.

"We know we have a job to do."

Sheridan has helped groom Indiana redshirt freshman quarterback Peyton Ramsey, who has taken the starting job away from fifth-year senior Richard Lagow.

"We care about our players here and are trying to put them in the best position to be successful on Saturday," Sheridan said. "All of our efforts and attention are on those guys."

Ramsey has had success both in the air and on the ground and could present some of the same challenges Michigan State quarterback Brian Lewerke did. Meanwhile, Hart has coached up freshman running back Morgan Ellison, who has become the Hoosier's most productive back on his way to 358 yards and two touchdowns on the ground. The youngster averages 5.2 yards per carry.

Both coaches acknowledged, however, that it's going to be a challenge moving the ball this weekend against Michigan's top-ranked defense.

"We've played Ohio State and Penn State this year, and these guys are definitely the best ones we've played up to date," Hart said. "[Sophomore linebacker] Devin Bush is special, he's physical, he can run, he strikes you at the point of contact and he's a guy obviously that we have to be prepared for."

Indiana's offense ranks No. 69 in the country in total yards (408.4 yards per game). Ramsey is 61-of-89 passing (68.5 percent) for 637 yards with six touchdowns and just two interceptions. He has also run for 171 yards and two scores on 49 carries (3.5-yard average).

"[Michigan's defense] has 11 great players on it," DeBord said. "They're not that complex in the secondary, they play a lot of man free coverage or man coverage, and I think they're very well coached when you watch their techniques and stuff. I think the complex part of it is up front."

Wolverine Watch: A Cold, Stinging Slap

The first loss of any Michigan football season always brings about the sensation, for fans, of getting a five-gallon bucket of ice water dumped on their heads.

When Michigan State gets involved, it's more like ice-cold sewage.

But life goes on, if not quite as fragrantly for a while. The 2017 Wolverines are not going to be what they were never going to be anyway.

Wait, what? That's right. This wasn't an undefeated team in the making. It wasn't a College Football Playoff contender. It wasn't a team looking to roll unscathed through the Big Ten, or even the East Division thereof.

Everyone acknowledged it nationally, and all but the most dewey-eyed dreamers did so locally. Michigan simply lost too much personnel off a should-have-been playoff squad to not feel the bite of a rebuilding year.

Michigan fans just didn't want to feel it this soon, in this game. And frankly, they didn't have to. But it was coming, as sure as a 15-handicapper is going to make double bogey along the way.

There are a million woulda, coulda, shouldas surrounding the Wolverines' rain-soaked misery versus the Spartans. Five turnovers? That's the biggest gift to an MSU squad since Spartan Bob offered up the one-fingered time discount in 2001, while simultaneously extending another finger to Michigan.

A second-half scene right out of The Perfect Storm? Makes for a good movie, but George Clooney didn't come out with the Paul Bunyan Trophy, either.

You want to win a game when the "M" suddenly stands for monsoon? Don't whiff on first-half chances, while the radar is screaming for urgency.

"It's just sloppy," fifth-year senior center Pat Kugler ruminated on Monday. "We played a sloppy game. Everyone can see that."

It wasn't the first time this year that Michigan's offense scrambled to find itself. It's just the first time the Wolverines paid the ultimate football price for too many gaffes.

Continuity hasn't been Michigan's best friend on the offensive side of the ball. The starting quarterback: gone, on a Purdue cheap shot. The best wide receiver: sayonara, with a fractured foot. A reconstituted right side of the offensive line: still trying to sort it all out.

Even the coaching hasn't stayed the same. Quarterbacks coach/receivers coach/passing game coordinator Jedd Fisch bolts for UCLA, and Pep Hamilton

comes in. Hamilton is a pro, having worked with Jim Harbaugh in college and as an NFL assistant. But it's another change, and the mix of offensive coordinator Tim Drevno, Hamilton and Harbaugh — who has the final word on play calls — is seeking what the Wolverines do well.

That's no simple task, when you're tied for 115th out of 129 teams in allowing the fewest tackles for loss per game (7.6 average) nationally.

As well as Michigan weathered the personnel changeover storm on defense (presently No. 1 in the country in total defense), it's sprung some leaks on offense. Its 27.2 points per game — defense and special teams aided, no less — stands tied for No. 80 nationally.

Kugler boiled it down succinctly.

"I don't like Michigan State at all," he said. "We lost to them. We shouldn't have lost to them, and we did. It's on to the next game. We've still got all of our goals in front of us.

"There can't be any more errors. We've got to win out. It's plain and simple."

It might be plain. But it's not that simple, barring a major upgrade by the points producers. The eye test says it won't happen.

Harbaugh absorbed his first real taste of grumbling since his arrival back in Ann Arbor during his Monday press conference. He heard about play calling and his 1-4 record against Michigan State and Ohio State, proving combative on both topics.

"The record is what the record is," he said. "I'm well aware of what the record is. Against Michigan State and Ohio State, we're 1-4. The record against all other opponents is 23-3. We know what the records are.

"We want to win those games. We want to win every game we play. We want to win them all. Most importantly, we want to win this one — our next game."

For now, that's all there is. The rivalry games will even out, Michigan getting back to even footing with Ohio State and controlling MSU, when the gifts cease.

But at the moment, Michigan has to survive as best possible the year that always figured to be the toughest, roster-wise, of Harbaugh's tenure. It doesn't get easier in a back-loaded schedule.

A cold smack is one thing. A sustained shower can, and must, be avoided.

By The Numbers: Michigan Has Bounced Back Well From Losses Under Harbaugh

With Saturday's 14-10 loss to Michigan State, Michigan has now dropped a total of seven games during Jim Harbaugh's two-plus years in Ann Arbor.

One of the factors that has allowed Harbaugh to compile a 24-7 record during his time at U-M, though, is that his teams haven't endured any prolonged losing streaks. In fact, the Wolverines have only lost back-to-back games one time under him — versus Ohio State in the regular-season finale and Florida State in the Orange Bowl to close out the 2016 season.

Here's a look at each loss during the Harbaugh era, and the ensuing game's result:

Some may argue that Michigan has a 5-1 record after losses since 2015 because it has faced poor competition in its ensuing game, but that is certainly not the case.

All the teams in the "following game" category above (prior to 2017) played in bowl games in the respective year listed, with the exception of Oregon State in 2015.

Moreover, the Florida squad Michigan demolished 41-7 in the Citrus Bowl fol-

lowing the 2015 season finished 10-4, won the SEC East and ended the year with a No. 25 ranking in the AP poll.

The Gator team that Michigan defeated 33-17 in this year's season-opener also held a national ranking, sitting at No. 17 at the time of the game. They were back in the national rankings, at No. 21, before last weekend's 17-16 loss to LSU.

Perhaps the most impressive aspect regarding the way Michigan has responded from losses, though, isn't who it has beaten, but instead the resiliency it has shown. Almost all the losses on the list came in games of incredibly high magnitude in which plenty was at stake.

For example, the 2015 loss to Michigan State was the Wolverines' first in Big Ten play that year and put a halt to the five-game winning streak they were on at the time. To lose in heartbreaking fashion on a botched punt would break the morale of countless teams, but the Wolverines showed "steel" in its spine and grit in their next game, winning at Minnesota on a goal-line stand.

Michigan was humbled by Ohio State in blowout fashion later that season, ending any hopes of a Big Ten East title. Despite not winning its division, Michigan played with passion and heart a few weeks later in its Citrus Bowl game against Florida, when it demolished the Gators 41-7.

When the Wolverines traveled to Iowa City on Nov. 12 last year, they were 9-0 and No. 3 in the country, with hopes of a conference title and potential playoff berth on the line. Michigan lost on a game-ending field goal, but remained focused and beat Indiana the following week, 20-10.

The Maize and Blue's 14-10 loss to MSU this past Saturday was as disappointing as any of the aforementioned losses on the list. The question now becomes whether they will show the same resiliency this weekend against Indiana that they've displayed in recent years.

369 Receiving yards for former Michigan wideout Jeremy Gallon in the Wolverines' 63-47 shootout win over the Hoosiers in 2013. Not only did Gallon set the single-game school receiving record that day, he shattered it; the previous high had been held by Roy Roundtree against Illinois in 2010, with 246.

503 Passing yards for former quarterback Devin Gardner in Michigan's aforementioned 63-47 victory over Indiana in 2013 at The Big House. Gardner's 503 yards are the most ever by a U-M quarterback in a single game.

Around The Big Ten: Week Seven

The Wolverine takes a look around the conference heading into the seventh week of the college football season:

Illinois (2-3, 0-2 Big Ten)

Illinois looks to snap its three-game losing streak this weekend when it hosts Rutgers ... Redshirt sophomore quarterback Jeff George had a rough outing in his first start of the season last Saturday at Iowa, only completing 22 of 45 passes with no touchdowns and three picks ... The Illini hold a 2-12 record in their last 14 Big Ten games dating back to 2015, with the two victories coming against Rutgers and Michigan State in 2016.

Indiana (3-2, 0-2 Big Ten)

Indiana hopes to avoid an 0-3 conference start when it hosts No. 17 Michigan this weekend ... The Hoosiers' 27-0 win over Charleston Southern last week was their first shutout since blanking Michigan State 10-0 in 1993 ... Michigan has dominated the all-time series with Indiana, holding a 56-9 advantage, including victories in 36 of the last 37 meetings ... The Hoosiers lost a 48-41 double-over-time heartbreaker the last time the Wolverines visited Bloomington in 2015.

Maryland (3-2, 1-1 Big Ten)

Having lost two of its last three, Maryland looks to get back on track this weekend when it hosts Northwestern ... Even though both teams have been con-

ference foes since 2014, this will actually be their first-ever meeting against each other ... The Terrapin defense has not allowed a 100-yard rusher since Nov. 5 of last season, a string of nine consecutive games — Michigan's De'Veon Smith was the last to do it ... Sophomore quarterback Max Bortenschlager is questionable for the game after getting injured last week against Ohio State; if he is unable to play, redshirt junior Caleb Henderson will start in his place ... Maryland has already lost two QBs to season-ending injuries.

No. 21 Michigan State (4-1, 2-0 Big Ten)

No. 21 Michigan State hits the road for a primetime showdown at Minnesota this weekend ... The Spartans lead the all-time series with the Gophers, 29-17, but this will be their first meeting since 2013 ... After racking up 10 tackles and an interception last Saturday against Michigan, sophomore linebacker Joe Bachie was named the Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week ... Junior running back LJ Scott missed the U-M game with an injury and is questionable against the Gophers.

Minnesota (3-2, 0-2 Big Ten)

Minnesota will attempt to snap its two-game losing streak when it hosts No. 21 Michigan State this weekend ... The Gophers will be without two key secondary players — redshirt freshman cornerback Kiondre Thomas and sophomore safety Antoine Winfield will miss the game with injury ... Minnesota's running back tandem is statistically the best in the Big Ten — redshirt junior Rodney Smith is sixth in the conference in yards per game (79.6), while junior Shannon Brooks ranks seventh (78.7).

Nebraska (3-3, 2-1 Big Ten)

Winners of two of its last three, Nebraska faces a daunting task when it hosts No. 9 Ohio State ... The Cornhuskers' biggest comeback in school history came against the Buckeyes in 2011, when they rallied from a 27-6 deficit to win 34-27 ... Nebraska has won the fourth-most games in college football history (889), while Ohio State boasts fifth-most wins (886) ... Junior receiver Stanley Morgan was added to the Biletnikoff Award watch list this week, which is given annually to the nation's best receiver; his 102 yards per game are 20 more than any other player in the Big Ten.

Northwestern (2-3, 0-2 Big Ten)

Losers of three of its last four, Northwestern travels to Maryland this weekend ... The Wildcats have dropped four of their last five road games, dating back to last season ... Redshirt freshman linebacker Paddy Fisher's 43 tackles rank fourth in the league ... A loss would drop Northwestern two games below .500 for the first time since it finished 5-7 in 2014.

No. 9 Ohio State (5-1, 3-0 Big Ten)

No. 9 Ohio State hits the road for Nebraska on Saturday ... The Buckeyes hold a 4-1 lead in the all-time series ... Ohio State's secondary was torched the first two games of the season against Indiana and Oklahoma, respectively, and found its pass defense ranked No. 130 nationally; since then, though, it has climbed all the way up to No. 17 in the country (170 yards allowed per game).

Purdue (3-2, 1-1 Big Ten)

Purdue looks to keep its impressive debut season under head coach Jeff Brohm going when it heads to No. 7 Wisconsin ... A victory would mark the Boilermakers' best six-game start since 2010 ... Purdue holds an abysmal 2-14 record in its last 16 Big Ten road games, dating back to 2013 ... After missing the first four games of the season with injury, junior running back Markell Jones returned to action last week against Minnesota and scored the game-winning touchdown with just 1:17 to go.

Rutgers (1-4, 0-2 Big Ten)

Rutgers will be seeking its first conference victory of the season when it plays at Illinois on Saturday ... Head coach Chris Ash announced a major position change on Tuesday, revealing that redshirt sophomore receiver Jawuan Harris last year's leading receiver with 481 yards — would be moving to safety to help fill the shoes of redshirt junior starter Saquan Hampton, who is out indefinitely with injury ... Ash also announced redshirt sophomore starting right guard Jonah Jackson will be out until at least November with an injury.

No. 7 Wisconsin (5-0, 2-0 Big Ten)

No. 7 Wisconsin will attempt to keep its undefeated season alive on Saturday when it welcomes Purdue to Madison ... The Badgers have won 11 consecutive games against the Boilermakers and have not lost to them since 2003 ... Freshman running back Jonathan Taylor continued his torrid pace last week against Nebraska, rushing for 249 yards and two touchdowns; his 153.4 rushing yards per game rank fourth in the entire country ... Wisconsin has won 23 of its last 27 games.

Lewis was picked on for the game-winning touchdown, but that was one of his few bad plays. It just happened to be a big one. "Just got my head around late, and [Green Bay quarterback Aaron Rodgers] threw it exactly where it had to be and [wide receiver Davante Adams] caught the ball so, great play," Lewis said in the postgame locker room. "We've got to do our job. I don't waver, no matter what. This is my job to go out there and try to stop them.

"They've got to make some plays, we've got to make some plays ... just didn't execute. [Rodgers] is a great quarterback. He has great weapons around him and we had to stop him, and I didn't."

• Richard Ash (Played at U-M from 2010-13), DT, Dallas Cowboys: Got cut by the Cowboys, but was signed to the team's practice squad.

• Ben Braden (2013-16), OG, New York Jets: Made New York's practice squad as an undrafted free agent.

• Tom Brady (1996-99), QB, New England Patriots: Completed 30 of 40 passes for 303 yards with a touchdown and an interception in a 19-14 win at Tampa Bay ... Has completed 133 of 195 throws for 1,702 yards with 11 scores and one pick for 3-2 New England ... Leads the NFL in passing yards and is tied for third in touchdown throws ... His passer rating of 112.0 ranks second in the league among passers with at least 100 attempts.

• Alan Branch (2004-06), DT, New England Patriots: Not active for a 19-14 win at Tampa Bay, a healthy scratch ... Has recorded two solo tackles for 3-2 New England.

• Jake Butt (2013-16), TE, Denver Broncos: Still working his way back from an ACL injury suffered in the Orange Bowl ... Started the season on the physically unable to perform list and will be out for at least one more game, though he's expected to return to practice soon.

• Taco Charlton (2013-16), DE, Dallas Cowboys: Did not register a tackle in a 35-31 loss to Green Bay ... Has recorded three stops (two solo) for the 2-3 Cowboys.

• Jehu Chesson (2013-16), WR, Kansas City Chiefs: Did not play in a 42-34 win at Houston ... Has seen action in one game and has yet to catch a pass for 5-0 Kansas City.

• Frank Clark (2011-14), DE, Seattle Seahawks: Started for the first time this year and notched three solo tackles, a sack and a forced fumble in a 16-10 win at the Los Angeles Rams ... Has recorded 11 tackles (seven solo) and 2.5 sacks in five games for 3-2 Seattle.

• Jeremy Clark (2013-16), S, New York Jets: Still rehabbing from his ACL injury suffered early last year ... Was moved to the reserve/non-football injury list Sept. 1.

• Blake Countess (2011-14), S, Los Angeles Rams: Notched two solo tackles in a 16-10 loss to Seattle ... Has recorded nine tackles (eight solo) for the 3-1 Rams.

• Amara Darboh (2013-16), WR, Seattle Seahawks: Played in a 16-10 victory at the Los Angeles Rams, but did not catch a pass ... Has three receptions for 26 yards for the 3-2 Seahawks.

• Devin Funchess (2012-14), WR, Carolina Panthers: Hauled in seven receptions for the second week in a row, this time for 53 yards and a score in a 27-24 win at Detroit ... Has caught 24 passes for 269 yards and three scores in five starts for 4-1 Carolina.

• Ben Gedeon (2014-16), LB, Minnesota Vikings: Did not start, but made one tackle in a 20-17 win at Chicago ... Has played in five games, starting four, and registered 10 tackles (six solo) for 3-2 Minnesota.

• Graham Glasgow (2012-15), OG, Detroit Lions: Started at guard in a 27-24 loss to Carolina ... Has started all five games for the 3-2 Lions.

• Ryan Glasgow (2013-16), DT, Cincinnati Bengals: Registered one solo tackle in a 20-16 win over Buffalo ... Has notched four tackles (two solo) for the 2-3 Bengals.

• Matt Godin (2013-16), DT, Houston Texans: Had been playing well with four tackles in two preseason games before tearing his ACL and going to injured reserve.

• Brandon Graham (2006-09), DE, Philadelphia Eagles: Notched four solo tackles and a sack in a 34-7 win over Arizona ... Has racked up 14 tackles (10 solo), 3.5 sacks, one pass broken up and one forced fumble for 4-1 Philadelphia.

• David Harris (2003-06), LB, New England Patriots: Did not play in a 19-14 win at Tampa Bay ... Has played in three games and recorded one tackle for 3-2 New England.

• Chad Henne (2004-07), QB, Jacksonville Jaguars: Did not play in a 30-9 win at Pittsburgh ... Is 0-of-2 passing in mop-up duty this year for 3-2 Jacksonville.

• Willie Henry (2013-15), DT, Baltimore Ravens: Registered five tackles (three solo) and two passes broken up in a 30-17 win at Oakland ... Has played in three games for the 3-2 Ravens and notched 11 tackles (eight solo) with four passes broken up.

• Delano Hill (2013-16), S, Seattle Seahawks: Played in a 16-10 road win over the Los Angeles Rams, but did not record any stats ... Has notched two tackles (one solo) in four games played for 3-2 Seattle.

• Kyle Kalis (2013-16), OG, Indianapolis Colts: The undrafted free agent began the season on the Washington Redskins' practice squad after a solid camp, but was signed by Indianapolis Oct. 3 ... Dressed for the Colts' 26-23 overtime victory over San Francisco, but did see any game action.

• Taylor Lewan (2010-13), OT, Tennessee Titans: Started at tackle in a 16-10 loss at Miami ... Has started all five games this year for the 2-3 Titans.

• Jourdan Lewis (2014-16), CB, Dallas Cowboys: Played a great game, notching seven tackles (five solo) and three passes broken up, before having a touchdown thrown over him for the game-winner in a 35-31 loss to Green Bay ... Has started two of four games in which he's appeared for 2-3 Dallas, missing the first with injury, and has racked up 22 tackles (19 solo), five passes broken up and one interception, which he returned 25 yards.

• Erik Magnuson (2013-16), OL, San Francisco 49ers: Not activated for the Niners' 26-23 overtime loss at Indianapolis ... Has yet to play this year for the 0-5 49ers.

• Patrick Omameh (2009-12), OG, Jacksonville Jaguars: Started in the Jaguars' 30-9 win at Pittsburgh, his fourth straight start and fifth game played for 3-2 Jacksonville.

• Jabrill Peppers (2014-16), S, Cleveland Browns: Started at safety and notched three tackles (one solo) in a 17-14 loss to the New York Jets ... Also returned three punts for 28 yards ... Has registered 21 tackles (16 solo) and one pass broken up in five starts for the 0-5 Browns ... Has also returned seven kickoffs for 148 yards and 11 punts for 66 yards (long of 25).

• Thomas Rawls (20010-13), RB, Seattle Seahawks: Started and carried eight times for 20 yards and caught two passes for 15 yards in a 16-10 road win over the Los Angeles Rams ... Has run 13 times for 24 yards and caught two passes for 15 yards in three games played (one start) for the 3-2 Seahawks.

• Jake Rudock (2015), QB, Detroit Lions: Has not played in any of the 3-2 Lions' games while serving as the backup quarterback.

• Jake Ryan (2010-14), LB, Green Bay Packers: Started and registered seven tackles (five solo) in a 35-31 win at Dallas ... Has played in four games, starting three for the 4-1 Packers, and recorded 18 tackles (nine solo).

• Michael Schofield (2010-13), OG, Los Angeles Chargers: Did not start, but played in a 27-22 road win over the New York Giants ... Has played in four games this year, starting one for 1-4 Los Angeles.

• De'Veon Smith (2013-16), RB, Miami Dolphins: Made Miami's practice squad as an undrafted free agent.

• Channing Stribling (2013-16), CB, Indianapolis Colts: Signed to the Browns' practice squad Sept. 6, but was released Sept. 19 ... Signed with the Colts shortly thereafter.

• Dymonte Thomas (2013-16), S, Denver Broncos: Played well enough in the preseason to make the practice squad as an undrafted free agent.

• Fitz Toussaint (2010-13), RB, Pittsburgh Steelers: Was signed to the Steelers' practice squad after being cut.

• Jarrod Wilson (2012-15), S, Jacksonville Jaguars: Not activated for a 30-9 win at Pittsburgh due to a shoulder injury ... Has recorded one tackle in four games played with 3-2 Jacksonville.

• Chris Wormley (2014-16), DE, Baltimore Ravens: Saw his first game action for the 3-2 Ravens and notched one solo tackle in a 30-17 win at Oakland.

The Week In Michigan Recruiting: Oct. 12

Here's a look back at the last week of action involving the Maize and Blue's recruiting efforts:

• With college and high school teams both several weeks into their 2017 seasons, recruiting news is starting to pick back up. The recruiting trail always has some action and some Michigan-related nuggets have surfaced over the past week. Here is a look back at The Daily Rewinds on Oct. 5, Oct. 9 and Oct. 11.

• Fort Lauderdale (Fla.) Cardinal Gibbons four-star weakside defensive end Khris Bogle picked up his Michigan offer back in May at the Florida Atlantic University satellite camp and has been high on U-M ever since. Communication between he and the staff at Michigan hasn't been overly frequent, but that has not changed his view on the program.

• Bradenton (Fla.) IMG Academy four-star weakside defensive end Nolan Smith has been committed to Georgia for almost a year, but that didn't stop Jim Harbaugh and his staff from offering the 6-3, 228-pounder. Smith, a Georgia native, doesn't know much about Michigan as a school or a program, but U-M has a man working on him from the inside.

• Some Georgia fans were surprised when they heard that Christopher Smith was taking an official visit to Michigan for the Michigan State game. While the four-star cornerback out of College Park (Ga.) Hapeville Charter remains committed to the Bulldogs, he has quietly continued to communicate with the Wolverines.

• Measuring in at 6-7, 360 pounds, Bradenton (Fla.) IMG Academy four-star offensive guard Evan Neal is an imposing figure on the field. With offers from programs like Florida, Florida State, Georgia, Oregon and more, he's quite imposing on the recruiting trail as well. The No. 2 offensive guard and No. 37

overall prospect nationally was offered by Michigan a while ago and has had pretty solid communication with head coach Jim Harbaugh since Sept. 1.

• Bradenton (Fla.) IMG Academy four-star offensive tackle Deyavie Hammond doesn't have a Michigan offer yet, but that could change and he hopes it does.

• Bradenton (Fla.) IMG Academy 2020 cornerback Lejond (pronounced legend) Cavazos picked up his Michigan offer at a satellite camp when he was still in Texas and has been high on U-M ever since. The 6-2, 180-pounder recapped his emotions from that day.

• Dearborn (Mich.) Divine Child four-star strongside defensive end Aidan Hutchinson is arguably Michigan's most solid commit and he's been that way for a long time. He was impressive in a 14-13 win over Father Gabriel Richard last week and, afterward, the 6-6, 248-pounder said that he was anxious to see his future team battle against rival Michigan State inside Michigan Stadium.

• For the first time in 2017, the Michigan coaches and support staff welcomed in several official visitors for the Michigan State game. Nine prospects from the 2018 class converged on Ann Arbor for their official visits, and while the weather and the Spartans both tried hard to ruin the weekend, the visitors didn't let that happen.

• Fort Myers (Fla.) Dunbar three-star athlete Shocky Jacques-Louis committed to Tennessee earlier this year, but that didn't keep him from checking out Ann Arbor in an official capacity over the weekend. Obviously the game didn't go as planned, but neither that nor the rainstorm killed Jacques-Louis' vibe while in town.

• Five-star wide receiver Amon-Ra St. Brown visited Michigan this past weekend and had a great trip. The Wolverines lost to rival Michigan State and the offense looked poor, but for St. Brown from Santa Ana (Calif.) Mater Dei, his weekend was memorable — and valuable — because of the overall experience.

• Julius Irvin was at Michigan this past weekend for the Michigan State game mainly to see if it would be the best fit for him. The four-star defensive back from Anaheim (Calif.) Servite wanted to get a better sense of what it would be like to be a Michigan football player and student throughout the weekend. Irvin had a great time.

• Washington D.C. St. John's College High three-star pro-style quarterback Kevin Doyle actually committed to Michigan just a couple of days after visiting Ann Arbor for the Air Force game, but kept it quiet in order to keep the focus on his team and his on-field performance against some big-time schools.

There was a lot going on for Doyle and his high school teammates a couple of weeks back, but he managed to set up a quick visit, during which he picked up an offer and committed all under the radar. The 6-4, 210-pounder explained

exactly how it all played out. Doyle's trainer thinks that his pupil has a chance to be great under Jim Harbaugh and Pep Hamilton at Michigan.

• Michigan already has a tight end committed in Hamden Hall (Conn.) Country Day School three-star Luke Schoonmaker and they could end up adding another one after recently offering Norcross (Ga.) Wesleyan three-star Tommy Tremble. It didn't look like U-M was going to tender any more tight ends in the 2018 class but one came through for Tremble.

• Michigan will host Raleigh (N.C.) Sanderson four-star defensive tackle Alim McNeill for an official visit for the Ohio State game, and Virginia Tech will host him for a official visit during basketball season in December. McNeill plans on taking his three other official visits as well. He will announce his commitment at the Army All-American Bowl in early January. Here's the latest with McNeill in a video interview.
